### PARTNERSHIP ACHIEVEMENTS

**MCCCD, NAU and TSMC** semiconductor <u>apprenticeship program</u> launched, preparing students for manufacturing careers at TSMC.

**University of Arizona Center for Semiconductor Manufacturing** <u>partnership</u> created to develop educational pathways for high school and college students to enter the industry workforce.

Partnership between MCCCD and State of Sonora established to create workforce development opportunities in seven industries for Arizona and Sonora students through exchange programs, apprenticeships, and internships. President Smith helped facilitate this partnership as the Arizona Mexico Commission Education Committee Co-Chair.

Second Chance Pell Online Laptop <u>Pilot Program</u> graduated the first cohort of Incarcerated Reentry Education (IRE) students to access online instruction and earn online certificates.

**Higher Learning Commission** <u>Student Success Academy</u> team established to evaluate and improve student outcomes.

NACCE Everyday Entrepreneur Program and Wells Fargo partnerships launched *Small Business Pitch* competitions and *30-Day StartUp Sprint* program. NACCE awarded a <u>\$20K grant</u> to sponsor 2025 entrepreneurial programs.

**Glendale Community College** <u>partnership</u> expanded GED® test preparation and workforce development offerings.

**Partnerships to increase voter access** included Sun Sounds of Arizona multilingual audio recordings of Arizona's Clean Elections Voter Guide; KJZZ 91.5 special election coverage with the Arizona Media Association and Local News Foundation; Student Life voter information events with civic non-profits; and the college serving as an official ballot drop box.

Honoring Smiles Dental Hygiene Honors Program partnership with the University of Arizona School of Public Health awarded grant from the Delta Dental of Arizona Foundation and Mars Wrigley Foundation to continue providing free dental services to people in need at the Mexican Consulate of Phoenix.

**IRE program at Perryville and Lewis awarded \$45K from Lowe's Foundation Gable Grants** for OSHA training and certifications, infrastructure upgrades, and lab space.

#### ENGAGING

President Smith attended the Raise the Bar: Classroom-to-Career Pathways summit hosted by President Joe Biden, First Lady Jill Biden, and U.S. Department of Education. She also joined fellow members of the Presidents Forum for a Capitol Hill briefing on higher education and workforce development.

Faculty Chair for Educator Preparation Jennifer Gresko served on Governor Katie Hobbs' Educator Retention Task Force to address Arizona's teacher shortage.

Faculty Chair for Dental Programs Monica Nenad began serving the American Dental Association Commission on Dental Accreditation.

Faculty Chair for Addiction Studies and Behavioral Science Patricia Hernandez worked with the Arizona Association of Addictions Professionals on the passage of SB1062 to transform addiction counseling practices. She also joined President Smith to meet U.S. Department of Education representatives to address behavioral health expansion (HB2691).

VP Janelle Elias published a Community College Daily commentary, Applying an Entrepreneurial Mindset to Design your Higher Education Administrative Career: Ten Tips for College and University Administrators. She also contributed an Education Technology Insights editorial; Digital Micro-credentials Serve the Workforce and Adult Learners.

President Smith joined the EdUp Experience and Presidents Forum podcasts to discuss Rio Salado's adult education, dual enrollment, incarcerated re-entry, workforce development, and other customized programs that increase access to higher learning.

The Tempe Chamber of Commerce hosted its 2024 State of the District breakfast at Rio Salado with U.S. Representative for Arizona's 9th Congressional District Greg Stanton.

The college hosted numerous events to increase community engagement including an MLK Day celebration; Empowering Abilities: Inclusive Practices and Innovations; Fostering Belonging: Understanding Introversion & Extroversion; a Jewish History Month Virtual Holocaust Tour; and Arab American Heritage Month celebration.

Philanthropy: NSLS students prepared 13,392 meals at Feed My Starving Children, Dash with Splash racers raised \$3,600 for scholarships, Be A Student's Hero donors raised \$5,350 to keep students in school; the Faculty Senate raised \$1,700 for the Jo C. Bennett Student Assistance fund, United Way donors raised \$11K for the community, and the college ended the year launching its **EmpowerEd** campaign for future students.









#### **INNOVATING**

Certificate of Completion (CCL) and Microcredential Pathway in Precision Optics Level I launched to prepare students for entry-level tech jobs.

Textbook Access & Affordability Taskforce increased low-cost, no-cost and Open Educational Resources textbook options to 60% of Rio Salado's 651 courses. The team also launched an awareness campaign and website to help more students save money.

Artificial Intelligence: The Innovation Think Tank published an AI Adoption Report assessing employee sentiments and suggestions for college policy and strategies integrating AI. The team also created a tutorial and chatroom for employees to engage. The Institutional Advancement team adopted Synthesia AI to produce on-demand, cost-effective instructional videos.

Academic Life Coach program launched to support underserved students as part of Avanzar, Title V Developing Hispanic-Serving Institutions (DHSI) grant funded initiative.
